Yule's position as the Winter Solstice emphasizes its role as a time of renewal, both in nature and in spirit.

As the darkest night gives way to the rebirth of the Sun, Yule marks a turning point—a moment of transition from the stillness of winter toward the promise of light and life returning once more.

# Yule Ways You Can Cefebrate

JOURNALING: Practice introspection and self-reflection, considering the lessons and experiences of the past year and setting intentions for the future.

- Pausing for reflection and intention-setting: As the year's
  wheel creaks into its next turn, quiet moments of gratitude and

  chapter to come.

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## Incense

### A Blend for the Returning Sun

This Yule incense blend was crafted to conjure the warmth and light of the returning sun on Winter Solstice, while inviting a sense of renewal and quiet introspection.

Perfect for rituals, ceremonies, or simply a moment of seasonal reverie, this blend is your aromatic companion for rebirth and new beginnings.

Frankincense and Cedarwood take center stage, their sacred smoke heralding clarity and purification, as if sweeping away the cobwebs of the year gone by.

Pine and Juniper Berry join the dance, bringing the crispness of a frosty forest and the promise of life stirring beneath winter's slumber.

Then comes Oakmoss absolute, grounding the blend with its lush, earthy embrace, a whisper of ancient woods and the steadfast rhythm of nature's cycles.

For those who dare to add a touch of Mistletoe—legendary leaves of protection and fortune—you're weaving in a touch of magic as old as time itself.

#### For your blend you'll need:

- 2 parts Frankincense Resin (or powder)
- 1 part dried Pine Needles
- 1 part Cedarwood Chips
- 1 part Juniper Berry
- 1/2 part Oakmoss Absolute
- Pinch of dried Mistletoe Leaves

**Optional**: If you don't have access to any of the dried ingredients above, a few drops of the corresponding essential oil will work. You can also check correspondences and make substitutions as you see fit.

What's a "part"? It's any unit of measurement you choose to use. For example, a part could be a weight or a unit of measurement like a tablespoon. So if you're using tablespoons, 2 parts = 2 tablespoons.

#### To make your incense:

Add your dry ingredients to a glass mixing bowl one at a time. Measure carefully, and if the materials need to be crushed, use a mortar and pestle to do so first.

If you choose to add essential oils, measure them drop by drop directly into your dry crushed herbs, stirring well as you do so to help distribute the oils throughout the blend. Feel free to adjust quantities to your personal taste.

Thoroughly stir all ingredients together well, reciting the following charm as you do so:

By sacred tree and winter's fire,
I blend this mix with heart's desire.
Frankincense for clarity's light,
Cedarwood to guard the night.
Pine and Juniper, fresh and bold,
Whisper tales of forests old.
Oakmoss deep, the earth it keeps,
Mistletoe's luck through magic leaps.
With every stir, the spell is cast,
Yule's bright blessings now shall last.
So mote it be!

To use, place a pinch or tiny scoop of the incense blend on a lit charcoal disk inside a heat-proof vessel, such as a small cast iron cauldron, to release the smoke that carries with it the desired energies. Use it during your Yule rites.

Make sure to sit the vessel on a heat-safe surface, as the heat from the lit charcoal disk can easily transfer and cause heat damage to surfaces, or a fire.

Keep your incense in a tightly sealed glass jar, labeling it with its purpose, name, and the date it was made. For extra measure, record the recipe in your grimoire and include the name and date. This way you can recreate the blend easily in the future.



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# Candle Magic Yule Color Correspondences

The long nights leading up to Yule wrap the world in a hushed, frosty embrace, and the warm glow of candlelight is a reminder of the impending return of the sun.

Candle magic is timeless, but it takes on an extra spark of enchantment during the long nights leading up to Yule. The Winter Solstice whispers of rebirth and renewal, inviting us to infuse our rituals with the light and warmth that push back against the dark.

Embrace the spirit of Yule by exploring these wintry candle colors, each one carrying energies of the season's magic. Let the flickering flames tell your story—blend the wisdom of ancient traditions with your own intentions, creating a ritual that's radiant and unique.

METALLIC GOLD: The Sun, Longer Days, Fertile Soil

DARK GREEN: Prosperity, Birth, New Growth

RED: Rebirth of the Light

PURPLE: Spiritual Growth, Renewal

WHITE: Purity, Peace, Protection, New Beginnings, Lunar

Goddess Energies

BLACK: The Underworld, Protection

In addition, there are some powerful color combinations we can call upon during this time of year when using candle magick. Here are some ideas, but feel free to reference the previous section and create your own:

RED, GREEN, & WHITE: The Balance of Light & Darkness, Growth, & Purity

GREEN, GOLD, & BLACK: The Cycle of Life, the Sun God, the Underworld

WHITE, RED, & BLACK: The Great Goddess, the Cycle of Life & Death, the Underworld





Creating an altar for Yule doesn't have to be complicated. You can set it up anywhere you choose, indoors or out.

If you already have a dedicated altar space, that will of course do nicely... or, you can set your altar up elsewhere in your living space.

Do you have a mantle over a fireplace? That's the perfect location to set up an altar for Yule. Your altar becomes a sacred hearth, a place where the spirit of the season gathers to stay awhile.



Once you've chosen the location for your altar, here are some ideas and tips for setting it up and decorating it for the season:

#### STEP 1: Start With Evergreen Boughs

Pine or Fir work nicely, their deep green a testament to life's persistence even in the coldest months. You can harvest some small branches yourself from nature, or artificial works just fine as well. You might want to add some Holly and Holly Berries for a pop of color.

#### STEP 2: Add Some Candles

You can refer to the correspondences section in this guide for ideas, but in general, gold, red, or white are ideal. You can add one focal point candle, or add multiple. The flickering of the candles is a nod to the light returning out of the darkness as they cast their warm glow across the space.

#### STEP 3: Add a Symbol of the Sun

A radiant golden ornament, a gleaming golden disc, or anything that whispers of light's triumphant return is perfect.

You may want to add a space for a vessel to burn the incense we created in the last section, as well as space for any offerings you'd like to leave.

Your altar becomes a sacred hearth, a place where the spirit of the season gathers to stay awhile. If you'd like to invite the spirit of the season in and consecrate the space, you can recite the following charm to consecrate your space:

By evergreen and candle's glow,
Through sacred light, let magic flow.
This altar now, a holy space,
Blessed by Earth and Sun's embrace.
The longest night shall turn to day,
As shadows lift and fade away.
By fire's warmth and nature's might,
This altar shines with Yule's bright light.
So mote it be!

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# Ritual Welcoming the Returning Sun

We've created a magickal incense blend, looked at seasonal and color correspondences for Yule, and have set up a solar altar. Now, lets perform a simple ritual of introspection.

You can do this at the solstice, or as many times as you'd like leading up to it. If you plan to burn the incense you created, make sure you have prepared a charcoal disk in a heat-proof dish ahead of time

This is a simple ritually you can perform alone in a few quiet moments, or you can easily adapt it to work with a group or gathering of family or friends.



When dusk falls, sit or stand in front of your altar.

Focus on the return of the sun, bringing longer days and fertile soil, as you light the candles on your altar and sprinkle incense on the smoldering charcoal disk.

If you have the means and the spirit of tradition, light a Yule log.

Let the flames leap to life, a tiny sun of your own making, and watch as its light chases away the shadows.

It's more than a ritual—it's an act of renewal, a fiery reminder that even the darkest night cannot hold sway forever, so savor the moment, taking your time to enjoy the process.

As the glow from the candles or Yule log illuminates your space and the smoke of incense floats around you, take a moment to look back over the year that has passed.

Celebrate the victories, mourn the losses, and marvel at the unexpected twists along the way.

Then, with deliberate care, turn your thoughts forward.

Set intentions like planting seeds in fertile soil, knowing that the lengthening days will nurture them into something extraordinary.

Yule is also a time for connection, so gather your loved ones—be they family, chosen kin, or friends who feel like starlight—and share in the season's bounty.

Exchange gifts that speak of thoughtfulness and intention, or sit together at a table heavy with food, where every bite feels like a blessing and every laugh a spark of warmth against winter's chill.


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
